It reflects a broader commitment to ensuring that every veteran from every era receives the care and benefits they deserve. This initiative is not just about addressing past injustices; it's about setting a precedent for how veterans are treated in the future. This rule is a testament to the nation's evolving understanding of the impacts of military service and a recognition of its duty to care for those who have answered the call to defend it.
